A Message from Pastor Aanonson:

On Sunday, November 29, we began a new church year. We are now in the first season of that new year, the season of Advent. Advent is a different season. Advent is a word that means “coming.” During this season we celebrate the three-fold coming of our Lord. We begin Advent by celebrating the coming of our Lord at the end of all time. Now, that does seem peculiar. We just finished the old year by highlighting the coming of our Lord at the end of all time. We bring in the new year by continuing that theme. In other words we begin the story of our Lord by telling the end of the story. Even before we celebrate His resurrection, even before we celebrate His presence among us through the Church we remember His promise to come again at the end of all time. So the first coming that we celebrate in Advent is His future coming. We begin the story by telling the end of the story. Just like many people who begin reading a mystery book by reading the end of the story first so that they know how the story ends, we do the same with the story of our Lord. Before we begin the story we know the end of the story. We know that the story ends in Christ. We know that our story ends in Christ. Thus, the future coming of our Lord is a story of comfort. Christ is coming again; that is the good news.

We then move on from the future coming of Christ by remembering and celebrating the coming Christ in the present. Christ comes to us every day through the Word, the water, the bread and the wine. In the reading, hearing, and the proclamation of God’s Word we meet our Lord. In the Word and water of Holy Baptism we meet our Lord. In the Word and the bread and wine of the Lord’s Supper we meet our Lord as we eat His body and drink His blood. Christ is continually coming to us. Christ is continually with us. As we

go about our daily life we are reminded that Christ is not only coming again, but also that through His gifts of Word and Sacraments He is presently with us.

Finally, on the last Sunday of Advent we will be especially cognizant of the past coming of our Lord, which is also the first coming of our Lord, the coming of our Lord as a baby in a manger in Bethlehem. I know that we always want to celebrate Advent as preparing for Christmas. In doing so we impoverish ourselves by missing so much that Advent offers us. We best celebrate the coming of Christmas by fully celebrating Advent and coming to an understanding of the three-fold coming of Christ. The time to celebrate Christmas is during the twelve days of Christmas (In other words, maybe the Christmas tree should not be tossed out on the curb by Christmas Day afternoon, as I have seen so often). The Christmas season ends on January 6, the Day of Epiphany, which in some ways is a continuation of the season of Christmas.

The theme of Advent is hope. And why do we have hope? Because Christ came to us, is coming to us, and will come to us. Thus, in all circumstances of life, we are people of hope. So, we begin the peculiar season of Advent. We celebrate the past, present, and future coming of our Lord, only in reverse order. We live in the comfort and hope of knowing that the story ends in Christ, that we are in Christ, and that God came to us to live among us in the person of Jesus of Nazareth. What a rich season! Advent is the fullness of the proclamation of the Gospel. "Christ is here. Christ is coming. Christ has died; Christ is risen; Christ will come again!" "Amen. Come, Lord Jesus, Come quickly!"

May each of you have a Blessed Advent and Christmas!

HAPPY TIME PRESCHOOL OF MUSCATINE:

The Board of Directors of Happy Time Preschool of Muscatine (HTPM) requested they attend the November Council meeting to discuss the 2016-2017 rent; a plumbing bill; and classroom issues.

- The Council was notified that in September and October some of their classrooms had been entered after school hours. HTPM discovered that their classrooms were in disarray and supplies had been strewn about the room. HTPM was informed that GLC will contact the other organizations/people who use the same classrooms to respect the placement of HTPM's property and return the room to its original setting after usage.
- HTPM requested a rent DECREASE for the 2016-2017 school year due to decreased student enrollment and state funding. Council asked HTPM to submit a proposed rental agreement for the December council meeting keeping in mind it will be negotiable.
- Council also asked HTPM to submit ideas/options as to how they could become part of the mission at GLC.
- A plumbing bill of \$69 was submitted and approved for payment by GLC.

ANNUAL CONGREGATIONAL MEETING:

- Council approved the date and time of the 2016 Congregational meeting to be **Sunday, January 24, 2016, at 9:30 a.m. between services.** This time slot will limit the meeting to one hour. Items for the agenda must be submitted to the church office, Don Ager, Mike Allenbaugh, or JoAnne Fisher on or before January 10, 2016, as the agenda needs to be publicized 10 days prior to the meeting.

TASK FORCE:

- Council approved the formation of a Task Force, in conjunction with the Nominating Committee, and the present Treasurer, to separate the current financial duties between a Treasurer and a Bookkeeper. Briefly, the next Treasurer would be a Council/Executive Committee member. The Bookkeeper, who duties would include, but not limited to, keeping the church books, filing taxes, payroll, etc., would be appointed by Council and supervised by the Treasurer. The Bookkeeper would not be a Council member.

GIFTS AND MEMORIAL LOAN:

- Council approved transferring \$8,800 from the General Fund to the Gifts & Memorial fund to pay off the loan that was necessary to meet expenses earlier in the year.

SOUND SYSTEM:

- Council approved allowing Ben Houseman to oversee the maintenance of the present VGA/Sound System.

ELECTRONIC GIVING:

- Year-to-date electronic giving is now up to \$5,600.

Monique Finds A Place for Hope

On a rainy morning, the radiant laughter and smiles of two young sisters fill the room.

“My daughters are very energetic,” said their mom Monique, with a tired smile.

Monique began partnering with LSI’s HOPES (Healthy Opportunities for Parents to Experience Success) when her oldest daughter was just a couple months old.

“I was a first time mom and young. I was so scared I would be the worst mom possible,” Monique said.

When parents enroll in HOPES, they are connected with a family support worker who visits them in their home to offer parenting support, track child development and help families achieve their goals.

“The people at HOPES are my family. I couldn’t tell you where I’d be without them,” Monique said.

Monique was struggling to provide for herself without a high school diploma, adequate transportation or family support.

“She was kicked out of her house and has been on her own since she was a teen,” said Linda, an LSI supervisor. “She was forced to grow up really fast. She had to sink or swim, and she chose to swim.”

With support from LSI, Monique earned her GED and went immediately into CNA (certified nursing assistant) classes. Today, Monique needs less support than she once did, but LSI is still there to provide a listening ear and guidance. Her family is now happy, healthy and thriving with optimism for the future.

“Our futures look very bright. My new goals are to go back to school, work on buying a house, and get my kids into a really good school. Because of LSI, my family will succeed in life.”
